SMU STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE DEPARTMENT REPORT

ABOUT

The President of the SMU Students' Association (SMUSA) is responsible for charting the strategic direction of the SMUSA Council and managing the Executive Committee to ensure that these objectives are met. The President is also tasked to represent the undergraduate student population to both internal and external stakeholders; including the senior management team in the University and the other Universities in Singapore.

HIGHLIGHTS

1. COUNCIL WORKING COMMITTEES

The 13th SMUSA Council followed the new structure of the working committees handed down by the 12th SMUSA Council, where members were allocated to working committees based on projects. Such a project-based working committee structure facilitates cross disciplinary integration such that there is more equitable apportion of the workload across the year.

(1) Branding Committee

The Branding Committee was coordinated by the SMUSA Communications Secretary and was tasked with two main objectives – (1) promoting student leadership through events organized, and (2) communicating the SMUSA Council's structure and activities to the general student population.

(2) Engagement Committee

The Engagement Committee was coordinated by the SMUSA Honorary General Secretary and was tasked with three main objectives – (1) reviewing and modifying the standing order regarding General Elections to achieve standardization of procedures, (2) planning and conducting of the annual Students' Association Council Leadership Induction Programme (SACLIP), and (3) consolidating SMUSA Council information that facilitates the handover process.

(3) Finance Committee

The Finance Committee was coordinated by the SMUSA Honorary Finance Secretary and was tasked with the main objective of developing the framework for a cash float.

(4) Strategy Committee

The Strategy Committee was coordinated by the SMUSA President and was tasked with two main objectives – (1) breaking down and defining the meaning of the Vision, and (2) defining the sphere of influence of the Association and building platforms for better collaboration with the various SMU offices.

2. COORDINATING COUNCIL OF STUDENTS

Formed at the end of 2015, the Coordinating Council of Students (CCS) is made up of various office heads. Offices were selected based on their level of interaction with the undergraduate population. The rationale for the selection base was to facilitate the coordination of projects should the project involve cross-office partnerships. The CCS convened on a quarterly basis to report their findings and updates about nascent University-level initiatives. Following the projects that CCS took up in 2016, we saw the changes for the projects in 2017 as stated below:

(1) One-stop Service Centre (aka Student Services Hub)

Chaired by Dr Bervyn Lee, the One-stop Service task force recommended the establishment of a centre that combines both online and in-person service functions. Ms Debbie and her team realised a centralized one-stop centre through the establishment of the Student Services Hub (SSH). The SSH aims to enhance the student experience by removing the need for students to navigate the organisation to seek out the right departments for questions to complete a transaction. SSH will be providing services related to Student Insurance, Campus-wide Lockers and University Concession Card. SSH has also rolled out Ask SmooSmoo, a beta-version ChatBot that students can Ask SmooSmoo anything from complicated applications to payment of fees. The physical hub will be situated opposite Dental@Uni with a team of friendly peer advisors and consultants available to help.

(2) Freshmen Experience' 17

Chaired by Mr Kenneth Tan, the Freshmen Experience task force was formed to renew and revamp the entire freshmen experience through reviewing SMU wide events, activities, talks, briefings etc that impact freshmen or first year undergraduates.

2017 saw the implementation of the second phase of the freshmen orientation project. During the Freshmen Orientation, the programme is designed to be a three-day programme such that freshmen do not need to stay overnight in school. This ensures that freshmen have a good rest at home before coming the next day to resume the rest of the programme. At the same time, it ensures that the Freshmen Orientation organizing committee members and facilitators have sufficient rest in school, to fight the summer fatigue faced by the camp organisers and facilitators.

Unlike previous years, VIVACE was held on the same day as the Academic Year Opening Ceremony 2017 (previously known as Convocation) to showcase the vibrancy of student life via CCA booths and performances as SMU celebrates the start of a new academic year.

(3) Food Options

Chaired by Professor Ong Siow Heng, the Food Options task force was formed to address four main issues: (1) food prices, (2) quality of food choices, (3) variety of food options and (4) accessibility of food options. The task force is in continuous consultation with the Leasing Business Unit (LBU) to creatively increase food options on campus for students, given the limited space.

(4) Student Learning Spaces

Chaired by Ms Gulcin Cribb, the Student Learning Spaces task force was formed to focus on augmenting the student learning spaces in the University. After the opening of the new SOL Building, KGC Law Library and Campus Green spaces, the analysis and data gathered by the members of the task force illustrated that overcrowding in the LKS Library, previously a hotspot for student learning, has been relieved. Students now have a wider range of learning spaces to choose from.

3. STUDENT REPRESENTATION AND MEETINGS WITH THE OFFICE

(1) lyf@SMU

SMU Labs underwent a revamp and was launched as lyf@SMU in 2017. SMUSA also held its first welfare of the year in collaboration with the launch of lyf@SMU. With the SMUSA Welfare held in lyf@SMU, students can once again enjoy the 24/7 learning space with the upgrade of a trend-setting co-study, co-work and co-living space

(2) SMUSA Hub

The SMUSA Hub is located at the heart of the Campus Green. SMUSA, ACF, SICS, SMUX and SSU has moved to a new office nestled in the SMUSA after the closure of the old CCA hall below the School of Information Systems, to make way for a new study lounge. The SMUSA Hub is equipped with the SMUSA Council Office and a lounge area where students can enjoy a game of foosball. The lounge also adds as an alternative venue for dance practices. Since its opening, SMUSA receives

numerous bookings of the lounge for welfare drives and CCA practices on a monthly basis.

(3) New Printing Vendor

Students will experience a new printing vendor in 2018 with new printers and printing system. Over the year, SMUSA and IITS evaluated and assessed available printing vendors to provide students with newer printers and printing systems. Students will be able to upload documents to a website for printing so as to allow Macbook users to skip the need for printer configuration. Printing locations that include scanners will now have a 2-in-1 printing and scanning machine. Do look forward to the new printers in 2018!

(4) Academic Year Opening Ceremony

For the past 17 Convocation ceremonies, they have always welcomed freshmen in a single massive hall such as Suntec or Raffles City. In alignment with the SMU penchant to change, "convocation" was brought back to our home grounds, at the newly furbished School of Law Building's function hall. In the spirit of inclusivity, the Academic Year Opening Ceremony (AYOC) was also an occasion for later year students, aside from the freshmen, to feel a sense of festive coming back to school, through the activities and performances held by VIVACE.

(5) 6th ASEF Rectors' Conference and Student Forum

SMU organized the 6th ASEF Rectors' Conference and Student Forum, which took place in Singapore for the first time. SMUSA was honoured to host student representatives from 51 countries during the three-day Students' Forum, where the President of the SMUSA Council took part in the forum as a moderator during student discussion on issues relating to the education landscape in Asia and Europe. The SMUSA Executive Committee Deputies also organized a half-day walking tour for our student guests.

(6) ALcove

Towards the end of 2017, SMUSA handed The Basement lounge over to the Office of Alumni Relations (OAR), which was renovated and will be officially launched in 2018 as ALcove. The SMUSA Operations Secretary worked closely with OAR to handover the booking system and policies that were used previously for The Basement. While students can look forward to a new chill-out place at ALcove, we thank you for the love and support you have shown to The Basement via event bookings for welfare drives, AGMs and even workshop sessions!

SMUSA VICE PRESIDENT

ABOUT

The Vice President of SMU Students' Association (SMUSA) works closely with the President to provide support for the overall management of the SMUSA Council. The Vice President is also responsible for overseeing the day-to-day operations of the Association, as well as the execution of Executive Committee's (ExCo) operational tasked by the SMUSA Council. Additionally, the Vice President will also head special projects suggested by the Association.

HIGHLIGHTS 1. WORK PLAN

During our ExCo Retreat in December 2016, the 17th SMUSA ExCo first conducted a visioning exercise to shape the direction for the ExCo; and this would have included our main goals and objectives that we wished to achieve for the coming year. Thereafter, using the direction as our guide, we chartered our work plan for the year.

The work plan created for each department would have included the key milestones required as well as each department's strategy to improve the portfolio. Each department clearly elaborated on their timeline and plans on how they wish to continue any existing projects and any new initiatives they created. To further refine the plans, the ExCo came together to provide input for the potential key performance indicators for each aim and how different departments can aid each other in attaining their goals.

After a year of dedication and resilience put in by the elected ExCo members and Deputies, we were able to achieve most of the targets set out in the work plan we drafted for the year of 2017.

2. DEPUTY PROGRAM 2017

After considering the dynamics of our team, we decided to revise the structure of the ExCo's Deputy Program this year. The program was designed to focus on the development and progress of the deputies and to tackle manpower issues on different projects.

We altered the recruitment process to purely recruit Deputies only. We felt that this alteration will allow our Deputies to gain more in-depth knowledge, skills and hands on experience about the department they are in. This change will also encourage self-development and growth through their increased involvement with the ExCo and it will also provide them with a more suitable platform to apply and enhance their available skills. Greater personal engagement will also be provided through deeper interaction with their direct secretaries.

An updated Terms of References (TORs) were created by the Secretaries for their portfolios to encompass their work plans.

The program formation was also revamped. In the past, there was the recruitment of both Deputies and Associates where Deputies are tagged to only one department while Associates were able to rotate their participation within a few departments. In 2017, however, the structure was changed to

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remove the role of Associates and to increase the involvement with the Deputies. Deputies completed their entire term in their assigned department and their involvement was scaled up by giving more autonomy to contribute to ideas and discussion within the ExCo. Deputies were also given the chance to rotate and try out different tasks within their department every semester. The rotation allowed them to gain a wider exposure on the entire job scope of that department. In addition, being tasked with a specified responsibility for at least one semester will give them sufficient time to fully grasp the skills they learnt thus far.

The main objectives of the Deputy Program are to provide platforms for the deputies to gain leadership opportunities, to increase their exposure to SMUSA's structure and department expertise, and to retain their interest to serve the Association.

In order to track if we met our KPIs for the aforementioned objectives, we created a personalized journal with specifically crafted questions to encourage our deputies to reflect on the projects they were involved in. It included questions that pushed the deputies to consider the work process of their tasks and their personal lessons. In addition to this journal, honest feedback channels and open platforms were also created for our deputies to share about their experiences (i.e. challenges faced, specific skills learnt) with one another to ensure that they will be able to learn about what each department entails. Sharing session for the journal was done during our ExCo retreat where we had an honest roundtable sharing that facilitated greater understanding on everyone's personal goals and values. Such an engagement plan allowed the secretaries to track the personal

growth and development of their deputies, gather consistent feedback for the program and to foster greater understanding between the entire ExCo. I truly hope that such activities were helpful in developing and strengthening the friendships forged in our ExCo.

Overall, considering how our deputies joined various summer organizing committees as well as how some decided to take the extra leap to lead our association, we felt that we successfully achieved the objectives we set out in terms of getting our deputies to understanding SMUSA on a deeper level, development of and greater exposure to leadership, and to increase their interest to serve in student leadership positions.

However, I do acknowledge that there is room for improvement for the Deputy Program and I am sure that with the constructive feedback we have garnered this year, the following batch of SMUSA ExCo will be able to enhance this program further.

3. RETREATS

The 17th SMUSA ExCo and the 13th SMUSA Council had the opportunity to undergo two work retreats in our term. The purpose of these retreats was to go through and track progress of everyone's work plans, and revise or propose any new initiatives. They also served as an effective platform to gather all members of the ExCo (for ExCo retreats) and the Council (for separate Council retreats) for bonding and a short getaway from the hectic work reviews.

SMUSA VICE PRESIDENT

For the Council retreat, we conducted a networking session with the offices, visioning exercise, allocated our working committee teams as well as engaged in depth discussion of our work plans for 2017. KPIs for our work plans and the direction for the council were also created for better execution.

For our ExCo summer retreat, each department had the opportunity to share about the updates on the current projects they are embarking on and discussions on how other departments could also value add or be involved in those projects. We wanted to encourage more inter-department interaction and for deputies to learn more about other segments of SMUSA. There was also time given for deputies to develop new ideas for their departments and feedback session regarding these ideas by their secretaries.

I am grateful for everyone who contributed in the execution of the retreats and hope that everyone enjoyed themselves!

ABOUT

The SMUSA Secretariat Department strives to safeguard students' rights by ensuring that the SMUSA Constitution, Standing Orders, and Guidelines are adhered to. The Department manages daily administrative operations, and is in charge of Elections Fever and succession of the SMUSA Council.

HIGHLIGHTS

1. SMUSA ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 2017

The SMUSA Council Annual General Meeting (AGM) 2017 was held on 25 January 2017. This event was graced by President Professor Arnoud De Meyer. During the AGM, the 16th SMUSA Executive Committee reported on their past year's achievements and accomplishments and the 13th SMUSA Council was formally introduced. The SMUSA Council AGM is organized by both the outgoing and incoming SMUSA Honorary General Secretary.

2. SLIMS BRIEFING AND GUIDE

The SMUSA Honorary General Secretary organized the first ever SLiMS Briefing for all CBd Honorary General Secretaries and Events Directors in collaboration with the SLiMS coordinator from the Office of Student Life. This briefing aimed to equip all HGS and Events

Directors with the knowledge of how to update SLiMS CCA Records and a Guide was provided to assist with the handover process.

3. ELECTIONS FEVER

The SMUSA Honorary General Secretary, along with the appointed Elections Committee, coordinated the General Election efforts across SMUSA, ICON, Bizcom, and all CBds. A standardized timeline for nominations, campaigning, voting, vote counting, and Internal Elections was created and adhered to.

This year, measures to standardize General Elections procedures in terms of campaigning procedures (individual vs group) and the number of votes each constituent is given on the Qualtrics Voting Platform were discussed at the Council level. These changes, however, required constitutional amendments on behalf of the CBds and thus will be revisited for discussion by future batches.

In addition, this year's Elections Fever exposed a few issues for the upcoming Elections Committee to discuss in the coming year – the relevance of certain campaigning clauses in the Elections Fever Standing Order (especially in today's digital world) and current vote counting procedures.





4. SMUSA INTERNAL ELECTIONS

The SMUSA Internal Elections took place on 28 October 2017, in the presence of the 13th and 14th Council, SMUSA Elections Committee and staff from Office of Student Life.

The Internal Elections took place following the rules and regulations of the SMUSA Constitution and the Internal Elections Standing Order.

5. HANDOVER PROCESSES

The SMUSA Honorary General Secretary oversees the handover processes for the 14th Council and 18th SMUSA Executive Committee to ensure that they are equipped with the necessary skills and knowledge before they take over their portfolio.

The SMUSA Honorary General Secretary worked on two different projects, which are:

• Handover Booklet for 14th Council

The booklet allows the incoming batch to learn about the job scope of each Council Member and Council Working Committees prior to the Student Association Council Leadership Induction Program (SACLIP).

• SMUSA Mass Briefing

The Mass Briefing was held on 11 December 2017 to brief all incoming CBd and Club student leaders on the SMUSA Standing Orders and Guidelines. An approximate of 80 clubs

attended this Mass Briefing. The purpose of this Mass Briefing is to ensure accountability and implement a better handover process for all the Clubs and CBds under SMUSA.

6. UPDATING SMUSA STANDING ORDERS AND GUIDELINES

It is essential to update the SMUSA Standing Orders and Guidelines to ensure its relevance to all Clubs and CBds. More than 25 changes to the SMUSA Poster Standing Order, Internal Elections Standing Order, Club Formation, Transfer, and Closure Guidelines were proposed by the SMUSA Honorary General Secretary and approved at Council Meetings.





COUNCIL WORKING COMMITTEES

1. Elections Fever Working Committee

The main objective of the Elections Fever Working Committee is to standardize General Elections process across SMUSA and all CBds to increase the credibility and portray a unified image of the Council.

ABOUT

The Honorary Finance Secretary looks after the finances of the Association. She signs the bill for the Association and ensures that the Association's expenditure is within the allocated budget. In addition, the Honorary Finance Secretary is automatically appointed the Chairman of the Council's Finance Committee, comprising the Honorary Finance Secretaries and Honorary Finance Controller from every Constituent Body (CBd), SMUSA Vice-President and the International Connections (ICON) Finance Secretaries. The Honorary Finance Secretary serves as the key figure to securing the budget and safekeeping the financial reserves of the Association.

HIGHLIGHTS

1. BUDGETING (AY2016/2017 SEMESTER 2)

The Honorary Finance Secretary reviewed the budgets of all clubs and societies of each constituent body in SMU and ensured that all budgets are in accordance with the Finance Budgeting Standards Guidelines.

The Budget Endorsement Meeting with the 13th Finance Committee was held on the 6th January 2017, and The Council approved the budget in the subsequent Council meeting on 15th January 2017.

The total amount for this budget period for the

entire Association was \$296,910.00. The total budget was made-up of the unused Student Activity Fee from AY 2016/2017. One of the Honorary Finance Secretary's main objective of the year was to increase the amount of financial reserves that the Association holds, and hence we have set aside \$8,305.59 for supplementing the financial reserves in this semester.

2. BUDGETING (AY2017/2018 SEMESTER 1)

The Honorary Finance Secretary reviewed the budgets of all clubs and societies of each constituent body in SMU and ensured that all budgets are in accordance with the Finance Budgeting Guidelines.

The Budget Endorsement Meeting with the 12th Finance Committee was held on the 22nd July 2017. The Council approved the budget in the subsequent Budget Approval meeting on 29th July 2017.

The total amount for this budget period for the entire Association was \$295,000.00. The total budget was made-up of the Student Activity Fee from AY 2017/2018. The amount set aside for supplementing the financial reserves in this semester is \$6,910.00.

COUNCIL WORKING COMMITTEE

The objective of the **Cash Float Working Committee** is to minimise students' personal expenditure on school events and improve the current budgeting system of the Association's finances in order to better utilise the funds for the future of SMUSA.

The Committee is working on one main project to achieve the objective, which is the implementing of a cash float pool for school events to minimise student expenditure. The SMUSA Council Cash Float was conceptualized because of a concern faced by students, and was identified by the 12th SMUSA Council. Such a concern is that students are paying way too much out of their pockets for student events that they partake in. This observation is based on the previous experiences of the SAC in leading and being part of Organizing Committees for such events. As such, the SMUSA Council Cash Float Working Committee was formed. The committee has segmented the task into 5 phases which is estimated to take about three to five years to complete. The 12th Council Cash Float Working Committee has successfully completed phase one, which is the research and plan formulation phase.

In the first half of 2017, the emphasis was on data gathering to test the hypothesis that there was a need to tackle this issue within the university, so future batches would be able to present this project to the Office of Finance as a necessity to safeguarding students' finances. In the second half of 2017, the team shifted their focus to examine current financial processes which could be potentially expanded, so that the cash float could be presented as a safety net for

worse case scenarios. Various CBds were asked to test the two main financial processes (raising of purchase orders and the cash advancement system) and provide their feedback on the difficulties they faced when using these processes.

The Working Committee is chaired by the SMUSA Honorary Finance Secretary Soh Wan Yih, Kit and comprises of the following members: SMUSA Vice President Angel Lee Hui Min, Bondue President Chin Rui Yuan, SOSCIETY President Jovan Yeo, and SMUX President Aaron Fabian Seow.

COUNCIL WORKING COMMITTEE

The Conceptualization of Association
Structure Working Committee was formed after previous batches identified the inability present amongst constituents and the Council to clearly articulate and explain the structure and function of SMUSA. This problem led to the impediment in branding SMUSA appropriately to the student population.

Since the committee was formed in the second semester of 2017, most of the progress lies on strategic planning.

Most of the progress of the Working Committee lied in strategic planning. The Committee identified that the lack of clarity or the inability to clearly explain the structure and roles of the Council could lead, or has led to various problems. They are but not limited to:

- Not able to effectively brand the Council to student population
- · Lack of credibility for the Council

With this in mind, solutions proposed by the Working Committee are as follows:

In the short run: Laying out the visuals of SMUSA's organizational structure

This solution includes laying out the organisational structure and describing the purpose and importance of SMUSA Council, followed by publications on various communications channels such as the SMUSA website, notice boards, social media and email.

With this initiative, the student population can gain awareness and clarity of what SMUSA entails. The Working Committee sees the importance of this because knowledge and awareness of SMUSA are key to the credibility of SMUSA. When students recognize the credibility of SMUSA, we benefit by gaining the trust and recognition from the student population and they benefit by having more of their needs reflected by changes enacted.

In the long run: comparative analysis of Council structure

In the long run, the Working Committee believes that it would be ideal to audit the current structure of SMUSA Council and identify if there are any potential flaws that are hindering the efficiency of the Council. For instance, comparing SMUSA's structure to other student associations' organisational structures would allow us to gain the benefit of recognizing the flaws and advantage of our associations' structure, and bring about changes if needed.

Through the distribution of the funds through SAF, it may be inequitable for the CCAs/Schools with a smaller population where they may not be able to enjoy economies of Scale, leaving some in urgent need for funds. As such, a formal and transparent

SMUSA CORPORATE RELATIONS DEPARTMENT (BIZCOM)

process has been implemented to ensure that funds are distributed and provided for those who really need them. In 2016, 20% of BIZCOM profits were granted to these needy groups – Adrace (SMUX), SMU Ted talk, SMUSA Assets.

With tighter purse strings, Bizcom would like to encourage more applications for the Bizcom Grant for events that benefit student life.

5. MONETARY CONTRIBUTIONS TO SAF

To supplement the growing demand for Student Life Activities, BIZCOM supported the school through contributing approximately 50% of its profits (\$20,000) to finance the deficit of the SAF. BIZCOM also seeks to help maintain a healthy reserve for SMUSA Council in case of any adversities.

6. ENCHANTE

Once again, Univantage bazaar was re-launched this year with a new twist, tying it with a theme to make school life more vibrant and fun. This year, the bazaar celebrated Valentine's day and we managed to procure a number of merchants who were willing to offer their products and services at extremely affordable rates for students. This included manicure services for \$5 to chocolates at \$2 all just to celebrate the spirit of friendship.

We would like to thank everyone who came down and contributed to the incredible atmosphere at this year's bazaar. It would not have been successful without all of you!

HIGHLIGHTS

Over the years, thanks to the support of the university and the hard work of many of our predecessors, ICON has grown leaps and bounds. As the 13th President of ICON, it brings me sheer delight to share with you just a few of the many things that we have achieved over the last one year.

1. SHIFT IN OUR VISION

The 5th Management Committee of ICON decided to hit the ground running at the start of our term and changed ICON's vision to further align with that of the university. alumni. We felt that it speaks volumes about a
university when you receive a personal
welcome and hoped that our efforts sowed the

incoming freshman batch.

Key services were provided for them including a well-planned out timeline achieved through coordination between various student groups and our offices. This included critical events such as their medical check-up deadlines, BOSS bidding dates, International Parents' Day and more. A comprehensive guidebook with details for medical check-ups, ICA matters, BOSS bidding and other services was prepared by our team. We also conducted bidding workshops for matriculated students and offered personalised services to many. The response for the implementation of the ISE map was fantastic with both the freshmen and the offices pleased with the simplified processes and increased turnouts respectively.

3. ICON ALUMNI INTERACTION NIGHT

At the other end of the ISE spectrum, we were glad to welcome back our alumni for the first time ever in 2017. ICON's alumni interaction night was one of the biggest alumni events of the year with over one hundred people in attendance including over 60 alumni from 13 different countries. We hope that these numbers will continue to grow in the future and I am confident that both our students and alumni will greatly benefit from this, the start of a lifelong relationship with ICON. A special shout out to Vincent and Andrew from OAR for all their support. This event would not have been the roaring success that it was without them.

4. ICON LUNAR NEW YEAR

We kicked off the year by celebrating LNY in a unique way. This was a one of a kind event that was a collaboration of over 6 clubs. Each club has food and games that were authentic to their nation's way of celebrating the festival. The event saw an attendance of around 300 people.

5. BUDDY PROGRAM FOOD TRAIL

Our first buddy event of the year was a food trail around the hawker centres near school. The welfare drive sparked off insane queues that would go on to be the hallmark of ICON welfare drives, running out within minutes of starting. The camp in fact reached to such a level of prominence that we had officials from the Prime Minister's Office and Ministry of Education come down to take a look at the stellar model for integration.

A huge thank you to the 16 organising committee members lead by the very capable Diana Jeane and Surya Gunawan Ali for their efforts. Without a doubt, Zixian and Wensi from DII were the key ingredients to the success of camp.



8. INTERNATIONAL PARENTS' DAY

Organised by the Ambassadorial Corps or ASMU, this year's international parents' day was the first in tandem with ICON. We saw the highest ever turnout tripled and a satisfaction rate of 98%. I would like to thank Amanda Chia, Kelvin Fan and Yvonne Looi from ASMU as well as Shuxian for allowing us to collaborate with then on this venture.

9. GLOBAL VILLAGE

The Crown jewel of the 13th ICON Executive Committee was indubitably Global Village. The first of its kind as a multisensory event, Global Village was a 10 day long affair that drew a crowd of over 1100 people cumulatively. Replacing the much loved Peace Day, GV had large shoes to fill and it no doubt did justice to it's scale. The day segment kicked off on 13th September and was inaugurated by President Arnoud De Meyer in the presence of several foreign consulates including the Saudi Arabian Cultural Mission and Canadian High Commission, both of whom were generous sponsors of the event.

The event showcased lovely trick eye backdrops which were characteristic of nations and had live booths that provided multisensory delight through delicious food, wonderful aromas, tantalizing tastes, touches of unique fabrics and much much more. The event was well received by the media as well with over 600 people in audience for it's opening. This also coincided with our View to The Village Welfare Drive that drew large crowds in. Celebrations continued with several clubs hosting their events at the village as well. The goal was to bring the world to SMU and our students were not let down with an Arabic Souk in a tent flown in from Saudi Arabia and Francophiles event under the French backdrop.

We commenced the night with a social experiment called the MP3 experiment in collaboration with the Hidden Good that saw hundreds of regular residents of Singapore flock to SMU just to try out a one of kind auditory adventure comparable to a

spruced-up version of 'Simon Says'. This was followed by a picnic under the stars with great food and even better music which saw performances from professional bands, students, staff and alumni. It was a nightto remember to say the least.

- As one of the departments under the Executive Committee of the SMU Students' Association, the SMUSA Assets Secretary has the following core functions:
- Chairman of the Grassroots Working Committee
- Chairman of the SMUSA Assets Management Committee
 - Management and maintenance of all student life assets – both intellectual and physical
- Strategic management and development of all Student Association facilities
- Perform such other functions as delegated by the Executive Committee

HIGHLIGHTS

1.INAUGURATION OF THE SMUSA HUB

Located right at the center of Campus Green, the SMUSA Hub was a space meant to be the centre for all student life activities where the various clubs can book to host their events and practice sessions. The space was constructed as part of the Office of Campus Infrastructure and Services' (OCIS) campus development efforts in which the 12th SMUSA Council was involved in the conceptualisation of the space.

Drafting of SMUSA Hub and SMUSA Council Office Standing Orders

The Hub also houses the SMUSA Council Office, a space for student leaders from the various student bodies to hold their meetings. As a space meant to

replace the various CBd rooms in the former CCA Hall, the needs of all those CBds need to be taken into consideration when drafting the Standing Order for the space, thus posing some challenges.

SMUSA Hub and SMUSA Meeting Room booking system

After conducting thorough discussion with the 13th SMUSA Council, a Standing Order was drafted for the SMUSA Hub and the SMUSA Council Office, with a booking system set up for both the Hub space and the Council Office meeting room.

2. RELOCATION OF SMUSA ASSETS

Along with the SMUSA Hub, OCIS provided SMUSA with a new storeroom at Campus Green to house SMUSA's assets. With the support of the SMUSA Assets Management Committee and various clubs, the SMUSA Operations Department oversaw the shifting of storage cabinets and assets of the various clubs from the main SMUSA Store to the new Hub Store. This alleviated storage constraint issues clubs who used the main SMUSA Store faced.

3. REGULAR ASSETS LOANING AND ASSETS DE-CONFLICTING

The SMUSA Operations Department continued to oversee its daily operations by providing logistical support to all student-life and SMU events and activities. This task is supported by the Office of Dean of Students (ODOS) Work-Study Grant

SMUSA OPERATIONS DEPARTMENT

(WSG) Programme where students are provided with financial assistance for working at the SMUSA Assets Store.

4. SMUSA ASSETS STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURE (SOP) REVIEW

The main highlight of the SMUSA Assets Management Committee' effort is a mass review of assets management SOPs across the various CBds. This project has several objectives:

- To ensure that all processes are robust.
- And that the various student bodies can be accountable to their stakeholders by ensuring:
 - The amount spent on assets are justified.
 - Assets are properly stored and maintained to prevent unnecessary purchase of assets.

As part of the effort to improve assets management procedures, the SMUSA Operations Department also conducted a review of our Assets Loaning Standing Orders and proposed changes which were subsequently passed at the Council level.

COUNCIL WORKING COMMITTEE

The Grassroots Working Committee looks to promote student initiatives and enhance student life in a tangible manner in the SMU undergraduate community. The Grassroots Working Committee considers a variety of student initiatives. In 2016, the Working Committee achieved its objective through the launch of The Basement-Student Lounge and allowing it to be booked as a free space for events.

Following the establishment of The Basement as the go-to place for students to relax and host their club events, the Grassroots Working Committee decided to explore new ways to achieve its objective to "promote student initiatives and enhance student life in a tangible manner".

Discussions to chart a new strategic direction for the working committee were initiated. This year, the committee aimed to promote student initiatives through exploring alternative revenue generating projects to increase financial support for student life initiatives.

One option explored was to relaunch SMU STUFF, the former merchandising arm of SMUSA. An alumni of the SMUSA Executive Committee who served as the Communications Secretary of the 10th SMUSA Council and the Corporate Relations Secretary of the 9th SMUSA Council, was brought in to provide insights and advice. Follow-up discussions with the members of the working committee were later conducted. Ultimately, the idea to relaunch SMUSA's merchandising arm was dropped due to operational concerns.

The Working Committee is chaired by the SMUSA Operations Secretary Nigel Seah and comprises of the following members: SMUSA Corporate Relations Secretary Wong Hon To, SICS President Mark Teoh, SMUX President Aaron Fabian Seow and Oikos President Gerald Chiam.

ABOUT

ASoc is the student representative body for the School of Accountancy (SOA). ASoc serves their students through three main avenues, namely Academics, Professional Development and Student Life. The focus is to provide ample opportunities to the students to hone valuable skills by providing various professional development platforms, be the bridge between the students and the faculty by hearing the students' voices and enriching student life through fun-filled events and stomach-filling welfare drives.

HIGHLIGHTS

1. ASOC ALUMNIGHT

ASoc Alumnight is an initiative by ASoc's Professional Development department and it was held on 20th January 2017. The event was a semi-formal networking session where approximately 60 SOA alumni returned to share their working experiences in the various sectors such as audit, banking, consulting and tax.

The networking session was divided into two parts. First, students were split into small groups to network with the assigned alumni. Thereafter, it was free and easy networking time over dinner and drinks.

This year, ASoc also focused to brand the event as an alumni homecoming as the alumni had a chance to catch up with their former classmates and SOA professors who joined us for the evening.



2. PROJECT MOOLAH

Project Moolah is a local community service project that focuses on SOA student volunteers imparting financial literacy to primary and/or secondary school students. In its 6th instalment this year, the project returned to Spectra Secondary School to attain an outreach of 300 students from the lower secondary levels. It is also important to note that the 2017 project was led by ASoc's very own freshmen Student Life Executives Marie Garcia and Geraldine Chow.



3. ASOC SENIOR'S NIGHT

Under the Events portfolio for ASoc, Senior's Night is specifically organised for the SOA graduating cohort to commemorate the end of their journey in SOA. This year, the event was held at The Basement and featured live performances, party games and a mouthwatering spread of food & drinks.

Overall, approximately 120 ASoc seniors attended the fun-filled evening to socialise and reminisce about their favourite SOA memories with their batch mates and professors.



4. ASOC FREHSMAN ORIENTATION CAMP 2017

Inspired by the ever popular 1970s film 'The Godfather', the exciting theme for this year's freshmen camp was Turf Wars: One ASoc, One Family. The storyline was centred on four clans going through a series of tests to prove their worth to the retiring Godfather.



The objective of the camp, in line with the tagline "One ASoc, One Family", was to provide a platform for freshmen to forge lasting friendships with their peers and help them ease into university life with the help of their sophomore facilitators.

This year, the camp was held during summer from 26th to 28th July 2017 and was packed with exciting games on SMU's campus all the way to beaches of Sentosa. The three-day camp culminated with the finale packed with sensational performances put up by different clans' camp facilitators and freshmen. Overall, the camp was attended 226 freshmen and its success is largely attributable to the 100 sophomores that made up the facilitators and organising committee, which was led by Shawn Giam and Ekaphat Mathiprechakul.

5. ASOC SYMPOSIUM

Symposium is our signature networking event with corporate partners held over a period of three days. This year, in addition to the career talks by ASoc's corporate partners from accounting industry such as the Big 4 audit firms, the event also featured talks by ISCA and ICAEW to inform students about the various accounting qualification programmes available upon graduation. Overall, the three-day event was a success with a total of 199 student sign ups

6. ASOC NIGHT

The main event in ASoc Calendar for 2017 was the inaugural ASoc Night to celebrate the 16th Birthday for SOA. The event was held on 7th September 2017 at U-Square. With the months of dedication and planning by the organising committee led by ASoc's Events Executive Nicholas Tan and Lo Simin, the event featured popular food vendors, an SOA Arts showcase highlighting the different talents of SOA students and the second annual ASoc Allure to crown the coveted Mr. and Miss ASoc 2017.

The event sold 515 tickets and was also attended by eight SOA professors and 50 alumni making the event live up to its expectation as ASoc's biggest extravaganza of the year!





7. WELFARE DRIVES

Under the purview of ASoc's Student Life (SL)
Department, SOA students saw four mouthwatering lunchtime welfare drives, each with its
own unique theme, in 2017. As ASoc's welfare
drives are widely popular for its long queues
due to the rapid running out of scrumptious
welfare packs, ASoc focused on catering to a
larger outreach this year. With efficient
budgeting and tedious negotiations with food
vendors on the part of the SL Director and
Executives, the outreach for each welfare slowly
increased before culminating at 450 students for
our final welfare drive!

8. SMU-IIAS INTERNAL AUDIT CASE CHALLENGE 2017

For the first time, ASoc assumed the SMU-IIAS Internal Audit Case Challenge and it was held on 3rd June 2017 at the Ngee Ann Kongsi Auditorium in SOA. The competition featured teams from the Polytechnics, Junior Collages and the local Universities in Singapore.

Besides the case competition aspect, there was also a panel discussion centred on the evolution of data analytics that involved various industry professionals from companies like IBM and KPMG.

ASoc's Professional Development's Director, Claire Gan, led the initiative to a resounding success as 168 students from the JC and tertiary level signed up for the case competition. Moreover, with the help of ASoc's External Relations Department, corporate partners such as PwC and Deloitte were also roped in to support the event by sponsoring the competition prizes.

9. SOA RUN

This year, ASoc was also delighted to coorganize the first ever SOA charity run with SOA office to raise awareness of the newly created SOA Student Fund. The SOA Student Fund was set-up by SOA Office to help students with financial difficulties. All donations to the fund would be disbursed in various forms such bursaries, emergency relief, study awards and textbook funds to the students.

The event was held on 7 October 2017 at Campus Green. Besides the run, the event also featured a bubble soccer and human gladiator station that pitted students against professors for a good cause.



Overall, the event was a huge success as more than 300 students and professors alike attended the event to raise funds. Professors also came with their families to support the event. This enabled their children to participate in the other stations that the event encompassed such as the bouncy castle and face painting.



10. SMU-MCCY TRANSPARENCY ASSESSMENT 2017

SMU-MCCY Transparency Assessment is a collaboration with the Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth (MCCY) and it is another initiative by ASoc to award CSP hours to SOA students.

In its third instalment this year, the initiative was led by ASoc's Honorary Finance Director, Muhammad Waris, and ASoc External Relations Director, See Ying Xin. The initiative spanned across 8 months where 61 SOA students assessed approximately 785 charities using the Charity Transparency Framework. Besides awarding CSP hours, the project also aims to provide an avenue to raise awareness among ASoc students on the importance of transparency and corporate governance in charities.

11. INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS SUPPORT NETWORK (ISSN)

ISSN provides a platform for the international students of SOA to interact and get to know each other. During the event, ASoc will also take the time to introduce to them their junior ASoc mentors who would guide them in their freshmen year.



The aim of this initiative is to ensure that these international students will have a social support system that they can rely on during their time in SOA. This year, the event was held at CHIJMES for cosy get together over dinner and drinks on 22nd September 2017.



12. #MY ASOCFAMILY

#MyASocFamily is a marketing initiative that was launched this year by ASoc's Marketing Department. The aim of the initiative was to provide a platform ASoc students to give a special shout out to their friends in SOA. As such, the campaign featured various ASoc students sharing how they met their special friends through the various ASoc events and how the friendships have played a vital role during their time here in SOA. These stories were then shared with the rest of the entire ASoc population on ASoc's very own Instagram and Facebook accounts.

13. ASOC STUDENT LIFE AWARD

The award was created in 2016 to recognise two students from ASoc each year for their outstanding achievement and contribution to student life in SMU. Each year, the award would be paid out from funds generated by ASoc's own events. In 2017, ASoc presented the award to its first two recipients, Tay Qi Rui and Wendy Ng Sock Ling.

14. DELOITTE RISK INTELLIGENCE CHALLENGE

ASoc was selected to co-organize the Risk Intelligence Challenge (RIC) with Deloitte in 2017 after outlasting several student bodies from the various local universities. The competition was aimed to promote entrepreneurial efforts and risk management in the business economy with this year's theme being focused on start-up companies. As ASoc's very own Vice-President Melissa Ngia led the event, the competition was a resounding success as it featured 39 teams comprising of undergraduates from the various local universities. The competition culminated on 25th March 2017, with the finals being held at Brewery at BASH (Build Amazing Start-ups Here).

ABOUT

SMU Business Society, affectionately known as BONDUE, is the student representative body of the Lee Kong Chian School of Business (LKCSB). The society's vision is to cultivate a fulfilling and dynamic university experience for SMU Business students' through unifying our students, while championing and serving their welfare, social, academic and professional interests. BONDUE has various events and initiatives throughout the year – all to ignite the kindred family spirit in its 3,300 constituents.



HIGHLIGHTS

2017 has been an absolutely fantastic year for BONDUE which saw the society expand to better serve our students.

The 13th Executive Committee kicked off the year with a clear focus to "invest" in our stakeholders: to strengthen BONDUE's

relationships with its stakeholders as well as enhance its current initiatives while developing new ones to create value to students. All this, to further foster our motto of "One Bondue, One Family" and cultivate the kindred family spirit of the closely-knitted student body which we inherited from the selfless sacrifice from past exemplary batches of Executive Committees.



As a testament of "investing" in relationships, we have furthered our sponsorship partnership with our exclusive partners DBS while developing new partnerships with Quorier, a delivery service company as well as Guardian's LipHop and HappyMask. BONDUE's relationship with Guardian began with Bondue Camp 2017 and is looking to continue into 2018.

Another hallmark of 2017 were the amendments to the constitution which were effected on 30 August during the Extraordinary General Meeting. A total of 12 changes were recommended by the 13th Executive Committee and they were all accepted and passed through a special resolution.



Two salient changes that were effected were:
(1) the inclusion of the Operations Director as an elected position in the Management
Committee and (2) the inclusion of a



conditional clause for general elections: where nominees who garner 4% of votes when there are more than 20 or more nominees will form the incoming Management Committee. Through these changes, subsequent Executive Committees would be able to serve Bonduers more effectively while providing greater clarity and accountability to our stakeholders.



NEW INITIATIVES

1. SUNSET BOULEVARD

To further cultivate the kindred school spirit, the exceptional members of BONDUE's Leadership Development Series (LDS) pioneered Bondue Movie Night – Sunset Boulevard, a social event aimed at unifying SMU students across all faculties. As a "free of charge" outdoor movie event, Sunset Boulevard provided students a brief respite from their studies, with finger food, popcorn, comfortable beanbags, and even a lucky draw for students to enjoy. Our LDS members successfully transformed the campus green amphitheatre into a tranquil area, for SMU students to have a truly unique movie experience under the stars.



2. REVAMPED WEBSITE, TELEGRAM CHANNEL & BONDUE LINKEDIN

With our fervent desire to further engage the student body, we looked towards expanding our engagement touchpoints while developing new ones through various social media channels. We set our sights on enhancing and revamping the current BONDUE website, making it more aesthetically pleasing while easing navigation through added function and features. 6. PROJECT ROOKIE 2017

Project Rookie is a first of its kind local community service project. Initiated in 2014, the event provides an avenue for SMU Business students to develop their mentoring skills and contribute back to community by sharing their business knowledge with aspiring entrepreneurs from various polytechnics, to groom future leaders and entrepreneurs of tomorrow.

Project Rookie aims to make a significant impact on the students from the participating polytechnics by equipping them with basic business management skills and inspiring them to seek a deeper understanding of the subject while fostering the spirit of entrepreneurship. The project then culminates in a business plan competition where the students were given the opportunity to showcase the skills learnt through a real-world business case study.

9. SLIGHTLY SCARLET

Slightly Scarlet is SMU's first and only iconic philanthropic fashion show. It is therefore a highly anticipated event kick starting the new semester. The event uses fashion as a platform to raise public awareness towards a beneficiary.



In 2017, we refocused our vision. Thus, Slightly Scarlet 2017 looked towards leaving a tangible impact on our beneficiary while raising awareness for their cause. As such, BONDUE wanted to collaborate with the Children's Cancer Foundation (CCF), a beneficiary BONDUE previously collaborated with for Slightly Scarlet 2012.

The new vision for Slightly Scarlet saw a breath of new enhancements such as increased frequency of beneficiary visits where a total of 7 beneficiary visits were conducted. ABOUT

The Bar, officially known as the SMU Law Society, is the student representative body for the SMU School of Law. Founded in 2007, The Bar serves to advance law students' professional and academic interests while also seeking to forge a stronger sense of community between students in Law School through the organisation of events and activities.

HIGHLIGHTS

This short summary of highlights from The Bar's 10th Management Committee's term in office only provides an extremely brief overview of The Bar's achievements in 2017. For more information and details about our activities, management and finance, readers may refer to The Bar's AGM Report.

1. PROFESSIONAL ADVANCEMENT INITIATIVES

In light of the tightening job market for law graduates, The Bar has stepped up its professional advancement initiatives,

working closely with law firms to organise networking and dialogue sessions to facilitate students being equipped with the requisite information to apply for internships and training contracts.



Such professional advancement initiatives include the Allen & Gledhill LLPs Legal Resume Workshop, Rajah & Tann Site Visit, Internship Experience Sharing Session, Life as a Trainee Information Session and the Rajah & Tann Dialogue Session, just to name a few.





On the academic side of things, The Bar organized two rounds of the Le Law Lelong 2017, an online book sale which took place during the first week of each semester.

Additionally, The Bar also sent out the Internship Application Procedures Email before the start of the semester to LLB and JD students, detailing the procedures which law students should follow to successfully get their internships recognised.

To facilitate students' sourcing of internships, the Bar compiled information relating to the internship application process of 111 firms and organisations to form the Internship Database 2017. Additionally, the Bar also compiled students' candid feedback on law elective courses to create a Law Elective Database 2017 that allows students to bid for modules with a better understanding of the various law electives and their demands.

3. EVENTS

The Bar has traditionally organised events to foster closer bonds between and across the different batches of law student and the 10th Management Committee has strived to keep up this tradition.

The Bar's Events calendar kicked off with Valentine's Day 2017, where The Bar created a platform for students to order cookies, roses and sunflowers for their friends and loved ones. A "Cupid's Service" was also available for those who wished for their items to be anonymously hand-delivered to their recipients. In the second semester, The Bar organised its annual Bar Day in conjunction with Prof Appreciation Day which aims to foster stronger bonds between law students across all batches.





The summer break was also an extremely busy period for The Bar with a jam-packed events calendar. In July, The Bar organised Law Camp 2017: Discidium where more senior law students welcomed the freshmen into our ranks. Law Camp has always been, and hopefully will always be, the most important and meaningful event organised by The Bar.



Shortly after, The Bar co-organised the Rajah & Tann Law Beach Games 2017 with the National University of Singapore's Law Club. Law Night 2017: Viviere followed soon after, where law students enjoyed a night of fun and entertainment right before the start of the semester. Lastly, The Bar organised Law Graduation Night 2017 for the graduating batch to come together to reminisce over the last four years of law school.



As 2017 was the year the School of Law celebrated its 10th Anniversary, The Bar organised its SMU Law's 10th Anniversary Events Series to commemorate the occasion. The series kicked off with a 10th Anniversary Law School Quiz which covered questions relating to the School of Law and its array of subsidiary clubs. The questions tested law students on their knowledge of Law School and simultaneously created increased exposure for the subsidiary clubs.

held an over-night movie marathon event.



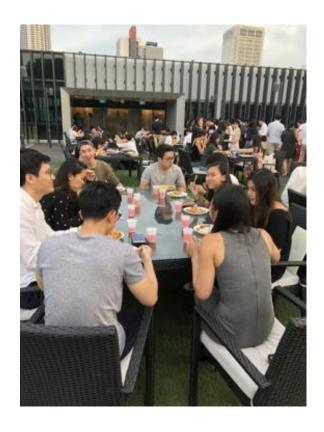
4. WELFARE DRIVES

The Bar's 10th Management Committee also organised numerous Welfare Drives throughout its one year term. These Welfare Drives provide law students with an important platform to unwind, socialise and interact during the semester, and have a good time away from the library to bond over good food. Welfare drives are both a crucial and paramount feature of The Bar's student life initiatives.



Over the year, The Bar has organised approximately 8 Welfare Drive which are traditionally held at the beginning, middle and end of each semester, as well as an additional examination welfare right before the Final Examinations.





5. THE BAR'S MENTORSHIP PROGRAMME

The Bar's Peer Mentorship Programme was a new initiative introduced by the 9th Management Committee. The Programme aims to assist the incoming freshmen with the initial phase of their law school journey, by allocating freshmen mentees with mentors who were either in their second or third year of law school.

The initiative received a huge surge in responses and the programme grew from only 10 Mentors and 30 Mentees in 2016 to 48 Mentors and 88 Mentees in 2017. With this increased participation in the initiative, The Bar hopes to explore developing the programme further in the years to come.

6. PUBLIC RELATIONS

The 10th Management Committee has continued The Bar's Public Relations effort to crystalize corporate partnerships with established law firms. The donations and sponsorships received from law firms and other members of the legal

fraternity greatly facilitate The Bar's efforts at promoting student life, as well as our efforts at ensuring the professional advancement of law students.

This year, in addition to The Bar's long-term partnerships, The Bar has managed to secure additional partnerships with two law firms. These partnerships provided The Bar with additional means to advance student life, as well as created additional professional advancement opportunities for law students.

7. MARKETING

The 10th Management Committee undertook numerous marketing and merchandising efforts throughout its term in office to raise awareness for The Bar's various student life and professional and academic advancement initiatives. Relating to merchandise specifically, The Bar increased the variety of merchandise available to students with a total of four shirt designs and received an increased demand for the merchandise that far exceeded that of previous years.

8. ELECTIONS AND SUCCESSION

The Bar's Election Committee helmed by The Bar's General Secretary over saw The Bar's General and Internal Elections process which took place in the month of September 2017.

After a period of campaigning and voting, a total of 8 students were elected into the The Bar's 11th Management Committee through the General Elections and the various positions in the Management Committee were filled through





the Internal Elections. The 11th Management Committee then unanimously co-opted one member as the Academic Advancement Director.

The 11th Management Committee will take office on 1 January 2018, and the 10th Management Committee wishes them the very best for their term ahead in office.



9. SUBSIDIARY CLUBS

The 10th Management Committee oversaw the creation of The Bar's seventh subsidiary club, Lexicon: An SMU Law Student Publication.

Lexicon is a student law publication that aims to publish law related articles, contributing towards the academic discourse of law in Singapore.

The Bar also has six additional subsidiary clubs that function autonomously within its purview – the SMU Constitutional Law and Criminal Justice Club, the SMU Corporate and Commercial Law Club, the SMU Law International Relations Club, the SMU Law Outreach Club, the SMU Law Athletes and the Moot Court Club.

Each subsidiary club caters to a specific niche area of law, providing students who share interests in these particular special interest areas to congregate. The Bar's subsidiary clubs greatly contribute to the Bar's efforts at promoting student life and enhancing students' professional and academic advancement.

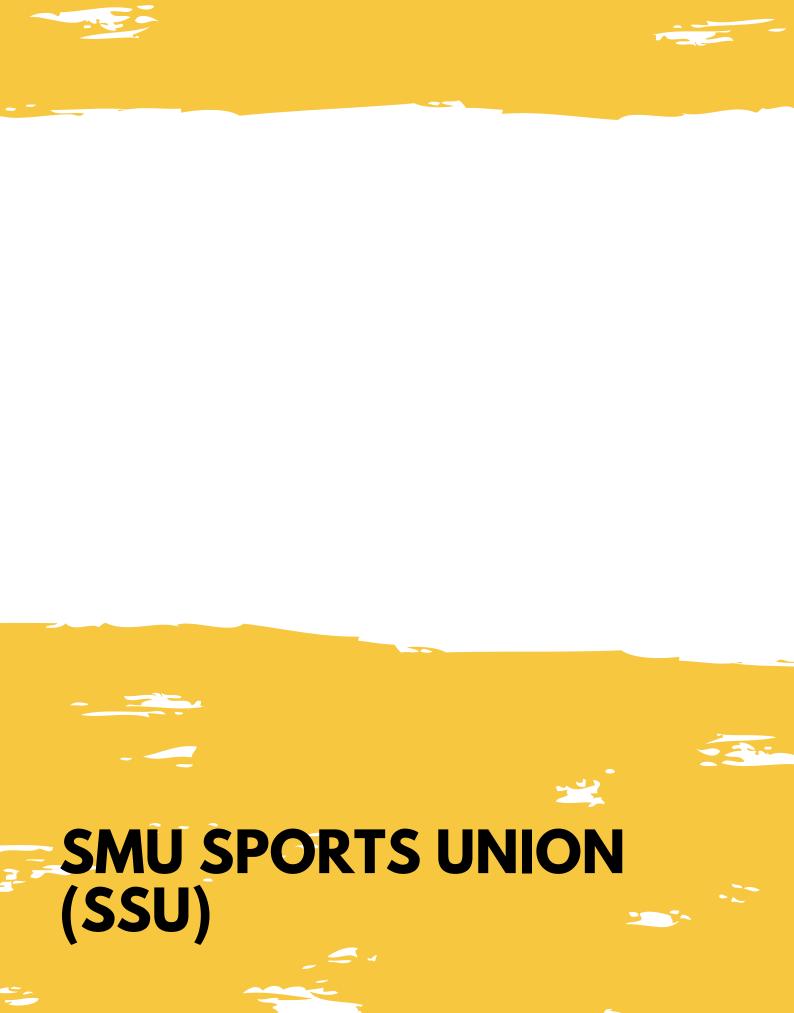

SSU's core functions include promoting sports in SMU through signature events spearheaded by the union, and to provide support for, and protect the interests of its member clubs by formulating policies and guidelines. Every year, SSU also strives to come up with new initiatives to better the management of the clubs and to cultivate a stronger, better sporting community in SMU.

HIGHLIGHTS

1. EVENTS

Sports Appreciation Night

Sports Awards Night has been a hall mark event of SSU throughout the years. This year the 13th MC decided to change its name to Sports Appreciation night instead as we decided to turn our focus towards appreciating the blood, sweat and tears of our sportsmen who dedicate themselves tirelessly to training, regardless of whether they achieve a podium finish. As such, we have renamed Sports Awards Night to Sports Appreciation Night, in hopes that the new name would wholesomely

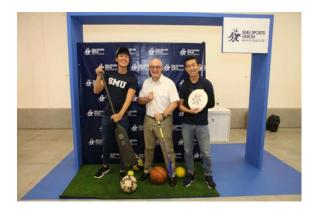

The annual SSU Sports Leaders' Camp was held in April 2017 with 68 participants. This summit focused on the value of Corporate Networking and Alumni Interaction events, leadership building, as well as inter-club relations. The 13th MC received great positive feedback that this year's summit was a meaningful one, with ample opportunities for inter-club as well as alumni interaction. We also incorporated team bonding activities such as Bounce which allowed our sports leaders to bond while working up a sweat. The 13th MC conducted several focus group discussions to talk about challenges that they have faced during their term, issues on club management and exchanged ideas on the way they lead their clubs. The 13th MC took this opportunity to conduct the 1st President's Forum to gather feedback on our policies and discuss possible new initiatives for the SSU community.









President's Forum

The Presidents' Forum is held twice annually, once in each semester. The first forum in 2017 was held during the Sports Leaders' Camp and the second was held in conjunction with the introduction of the SSU 14th MC candidates during their elections speeches. The primary purpose of the bi-annual forum is to update sports clubs with policies and initiatives through department presentation by the SSU directors. The forum is also a platform to facilitate discussion and to receive feedback and input from our sports leaders.

SSU Day

SSU day is our annual welfare drive to encourage and applaud our sportsmen for their commendable efforts this year. We distributed newly designed SSU stickers, towels and limited-edition mouse, as well as food and snacks to them. The turnout was fantastic with snaking queues of our sportsmen in their SSU T-shirt and jerseys.

2. Initiatives

Club Classification System Revamp

The Club Classification System is in place to enable for a fair distribution of resources amongst Sports Clubs. Clubs will be split into Core, Merit, Interest A and Interest B clubs with differing level of subsidies for their training. Points are awarded to clubs in two categories – Competitions and Events.

The 13th MC successfully implemented the change in criteria led by the previous MC whereby clubs are split into three categories -Individual, Team Events, and Team Sports. Previously, clubs are not evaluated if they had new events like corporate networking, community service or alumni engagement. This year, we introduced a sub category to reward clubs that engage in activities that were aforementioned. We hope this will allow for greater efficiency in the distribution of resources and incentivise clubs to work hard and bring glory to SMU.





This year, we launched the SSU Seed Funding whereby the focus was to encourage sports clubs to develop in three new areas. Namely, Corporate Networking, Community Service, and Alumni Engagement. The collaboration with OSL Sports and Adventure Cluster would help provide support to who are in their first few years of trying out an event. This year we saw 8 seed funding applications being approved with events varying from corporate networking through sports with KPMG and Citibank, start-up events and alumni interaction events. Moving forward, we continue to hope that this initiative will enable clubs to strive for more and not be discouraged by the lack of resources.

Attendance Tracking System

As part of SSU's mission to promote sporting excellence and forge stronger bonds within our clubs, it is essential that members are committed their training regime. The Honorary General Secretary (HGS) initiated the attendance tracking system with the intention to improve the attendance of the members by improving the commitment level of their members.

The Attendance system enabled SSU to understand the overall commitment levels of the members. Sports clubs also provided feedback to SSU on how SSU could value

add and facilitate the Exco in encouraging members to attend training. By sharing good practices from every sports clubs, clubs can learn from one another and translate these practices to their own trainings. Additionally, it allows SSU to formulate strategies customised to each club after understanding their specific problems.

Club Buddy System

The HGS was in charge of ensuring that the 13th MC members were actively in touch with their buddy clubs. It can be in the form of attending trainings, supporting clubs in their competitions and attending AGMs.

This year the club buddy system was further improved from the year before. Firstly, we ensured that every member of the 13th MC has a Telegram group chat with the Exco of their buddy clubs. This allowed not only information dissemination but also a more informal relationship between the clubs and SSU. Secondly, it helped to facilitate a vibrant sporting culture in SMU where students are able to obtain live updates of competitions through our Instastory and Instalive feed. These were not possible without the effort of each MC member travelling down personally to support our athletes competing. Lastly, the club buddy system enabled us to understand the club's needs and challenges on a deeper level, the information collected is then shared amongst the 13th MC for us to strategise and evaluate our current policies and procedures.

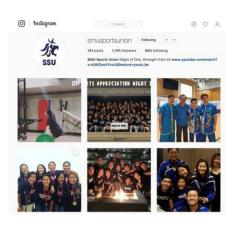




Social Media Outreach

SMU Sports Union continues to reach out to our internal and external stakeholders through our main platform of communication -Facebook and Instagram. These platforms were effective in promoting our signature events, clubs and club-related events for the year. The content posted on our Instagram page included at least 1 post for every club to ensure there is fair and sufficient coverage of our clubs in SSU. In addition, we have also noticed a stark increase in our Instagram followers from 750 to almost 1150 followers. To encourage clubs to embark on corporate networking sessions through sports, SSU aims to be the bridge between clubs and corporate companies by taking the first step in reaching out to firms like Deloitte, KPMG, Citibank. We ended a remarkable year with a total of 9 networking sessions through various sports and firms. Our efforts were also mentioned in Deloitte's monthly newsletter featuring the successful networking sessions -Unarmed Combat, Tennis and Climb.

(1) DOMICILE AND ACTIVITIES

- The Singapore Management University Students' Association (SMUSA) was formed in the Republic of Singapore in 2000 by the pioneer batch of students of the Singapore Management University.
- The principal objectives of the Association are to promote and safeguard the interests of the members of the association; to uphold and respect the dignity and equality of every member of the association without regard to religion, race, or politics; and to promote welfare, social, cultural educational, and sporting activities to the members of the association.
- The principal activity of the association is to provide support to the various member
 Constituent Bodies (CBd) and member Co-Curricular Activities Group (CCA), encouraging their endeavors in enhancing student life and participation in co-curriculum activities in enhancing student life.

(2) BASIS OF PREPARATION

- These notes form an integral part and should be read in conjunction with the accompanying Statement of Income and Expenditure.
- The Statement of Income and Expenditure for the year ended 31st December 2017 is prepared based on information extracted from the University's SAP

accounting records.

The statement is prepared through consultation with every CBd Finance Secretary in conjunction with all the records available. Our Statement is not prepared in accordance with the Signapore Financial Reporting Standards (FRS) as it is not necessary for SMUSA to comply with FRS regulations. The association is unable to prepare an accompanying Balance Sheet and Statement of Changes in Equity as all the disbursement of funds towards SMUSA are considered as an expenditure by the university. The unaudited Statement of Income and Expenditure was prepared by the 17th **Executive Committee's Honorary Finance** Secretary, Ms Soh Wan Yih (Kit), and the Finance Secretary of all the CBd under the jurisdiction of SMUSA, with guidance from Office of Finance on the use of the SAP system.

(3) INCOME

Income refers to all funds that are channelled into the clubs & societies respective account codes and they are largely grouped into 6 different categories.

3.1 Student Activity Fee

On behalf of SMUSA, SMU Office of Finance helps to collect the Student Activity Fee from each student at the start of the academic year. The fees are recognised when the University makes a transfer to SMUSA. The amount will then be used to fund student life activities primarily for August to December of the financial year.



3.2 Office of Student Life

The President's Office channels funds into SMUSA every year through OSL to help fund student life activities primarily between January to July of the financial year. The amount is recognized when the transfer is made from OSL to SMUSA.

3.3 SMUSA Council

The SMUSA Council increased the support of the total budget issued throughout the year by tapping into the Association's reserves. This was done in recognition of the increase in club membership size as well as numbers of activities introduced by the various CBds to the association.

3.4 Club Collection/Incidental Profits

The club collection includes membership fees collected by the clubs during the term as well as fee collections for workshops and competitions arranged by the respective clubs & societies. The incidental profits refers to the profits generated by the clubs & societies through their events or sales of tee-shirts and other signature products.

3.5 OSL/School Admin Additional Funding

OSL and School Admin fundings includes the extra aid to the clubs by the 6 school general offices as well as OSL under the various outreach programs such as Sports/Arts Excellence Programmes and/or in support if selected club organized initiatives.
